British Values at Kew Woods:

As a school and part of Southport Learning Trust we aim to improve life chances of all learners no matter what their background or circumstance. We do this through our values of connect, kindness and believe.

Mutual Respect:

RE, Collective Worship and Life Learning encourage us to show respect for others.

We celebrate and recognise many events throughout the year such as religious festivals and explore how and why they are celebrated. We have bespoke events throughout the year such as 'Positive Noticing Day 'and 'Friendship Friday'.

We discuss current news stories regarding protected groups, exposing pupils to 'Big Picture News' and 'Newsround', and discussing the issues raised.

We have a range of class books on themes of equality and diversity. We raise money for charities throughout the year including children in need and red nose day.

In year 3 we complete a course of sign language lessons to develop an understanding of how deaf people can communicate.

Tolerance of different faiths and religions:

We learn about the beliefs of different religions and those with different beliefs through RE lessons and Collective Worship.

We discuss news stories when there is an opportunity for learning.

In life learning we learn about how we are all unique in our beliefs and practices.

Democracy:

We have a democratic process through the election of various committees, including School Council and Eco Council.
